1. Parks need to have the resources, knowledge and staff to deliver the 10 year Green Space Strategy. Parks staff had no knowledge of this document until I brought it to their attention. There is no plan to actually optimise the park resource. Aside from the Woodland Creation planting all a other initiatives are driven by FKAP. Parks themselves are still see in the park in the same way they were 20 - 30 years ago. This needs to change and fast !! Relaxed mowing is essential not controversial, we need ponds, meadow improvement, cut wood being stored to enhance insect habitat. The sad thing is it sis easy and low cost.

20 mph zones like Vesper Road need to be engineered for purpose not just a gesture of speed bumps . Then monitored and enforced.

Spread the new hire bikes to Kirkstall. In particular, this should connect the train stations to the bike network. Further efforts to allow wild areas in the parks and other green areas (though these also need to be useable particularly during the summer for leisure). The major roads through Kirkstall are difficult to reduce traffic on, but I would welcome further steps to reduce traffic in the residential streets off them and efforts to shut off rat runs to anyone other than residents. A zebra crossing or

something similar between Kirkstall Lights and the Abbey and down towards the Vesper Gate and Kirkstall Forge would encourage further active travel. Similarly on Morris Lane towards the parks.

There are a lot of family homes in the area, but a lot of old people in the area. These people need to down size to give opportunities to families to live in bigger properties. Older people do not want to move out of area and want nice homes to downsize to this. This needs to be created to free up the bigger houses for families.

I would like to move to another area in my location but there is nothing suitable for me ie a modern 3 bedroom, on a safer street, with a garden at an affordable price.

Some streets with concentration of HMOs in Burley have a turnover of residents of 40% over 4-5 years which makes it difficult to build communities. Housing is becoming affordable for a lot of current residents and new build prices are out of residents reach.

Rental market is killing people as wages haven't increased. Social housing is hard to get but the only affordable and reasonable option.

It seems unlikely that social engineering can change the makeup of the area drastically, but since about 40% of properties and over 50% of residents in our street are short term tenants, I feel any greater multiple occupation would destroy the sense of community.

Seems fine

A mixture of 1-3 bedroom properties of any type for rent or to buy. Surprisingly, our run down semi-detached neighbouring home didn't make it to market this week. It was Let immediately for £1K/mth within a day!

We need smaller starter homes for young families and bungalows for older residents. This will free up the existing housing stock for established homeowners.

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
People are struggling to pay high rent. My adult son is currently living in a tiny apartment and paying extortionate rent for example

Its not about the type of house its about if its is carbon neutral and if its affordable. Also if it is manageable in terms of infrastructure

I think social housing (for rent) should be a priority. Less property needs to be sold to private landlords. This ramps up general rents and reduces the opportunities for first time buyers. I think that developments should respect the character of the area, and density of development (if done well) is a better way to build on limited land than to focus on detached properties. It's important to keep a pipeline from small homes to larger homes available so that families can stay in the area. I think a large number of flats would alter the character of the area, particularly if they were done as poorly as many of the city centre developments. To protect the neighbourhoods's character development needs to be low rise and mixed-use: providing space for small shops, offices and cafes/bars/restaurants.



Easy enough to rent, very hard to buy.


I had to really wait a long time to get a bigger council house in Kirkstall. I'm very grateful as not everyone is as fortunate as me
